NATURE AND SCOPE

The programme offers a unique opportunity to study with leading practitioners and academia. In the programme, the students will examine a broad range of contemporary security challenges such as terrorism, civil war and intra-state conflicts, mass migration, cyber security and transnational crimes. Students will also explore the intelligence and strategic approaches used by government and non-governmental actors to combat security threats, risks and vulnerabilities. The degree adopts a unique approach to the study of security by combining theoretical, applied and empirical knowledge and skills sets. Students will explore the roles of intelligence and security agencies in democratic society to cutting-edge problems setting. The tone and direction of the programme will be a series of outstanding lectures and facilitators covering a broad spectrum of contemporary intelligence and security challenges. Students will have the opportunities to meet and work alongside with security practitioners and experts from government and industry and defence actors.

The programme consists of various activities including contact hours, teaching and learning tutorials, demonstration and visits case problems and field assignments provide opportunities for practical application of class work, specialisation courses, field practicum, performance improvement projects on various aspects of security and intelligence work and programme evaluation. The programme will provide opportunities for dedicated training and shared knowledge experiences and best practices. It will ensure students to:

- Attain a firm understanding of the theoretical concepts that inform contemporary security and intelligence studies
- Acquire the expertise and necessary

skills to critically engage with security, intelligence and strategy in an applied manner.

- Be provided with experimental learning opportunities with practitioners organisations and have access to a range of academic and non-academic personnel from industry and business, the security agencies, the military, intelligence community, governmental and non-government organisation, thus helping to understand how security experts shape security practice.
- Utilise mobility experience to develop, appreciate and articulate the importance of inter cultural awareness as a key aspect of addressing security challenges.

CAREER IMPROVEMENT AND PROSPECTS

The programme will provide students with the training skills and knowledge to perform in the public and private security sectors, media, security agencies, armed forces, police, private security business related activities or academia.

The programme offers specialised professional development to prepare security professionals for public and private agencies for increasingly diverse and demand in security and intelligence profession. The programme develops leadership problem-solving capabilities, application of security and intelligence technologies and advanced skills in security and protection sciences. The programme integrates the theoretical framework of security and protection science with the practical resolution of problems faced by the private and public security managers in both development and developing countries.

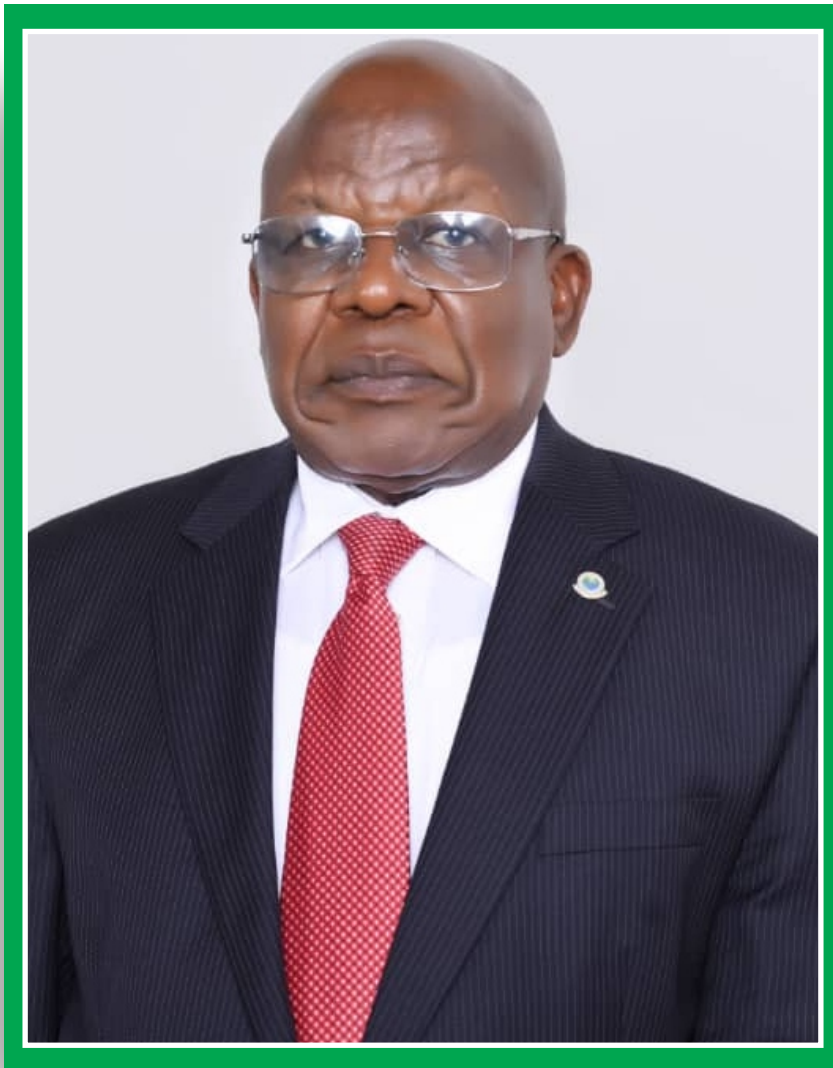

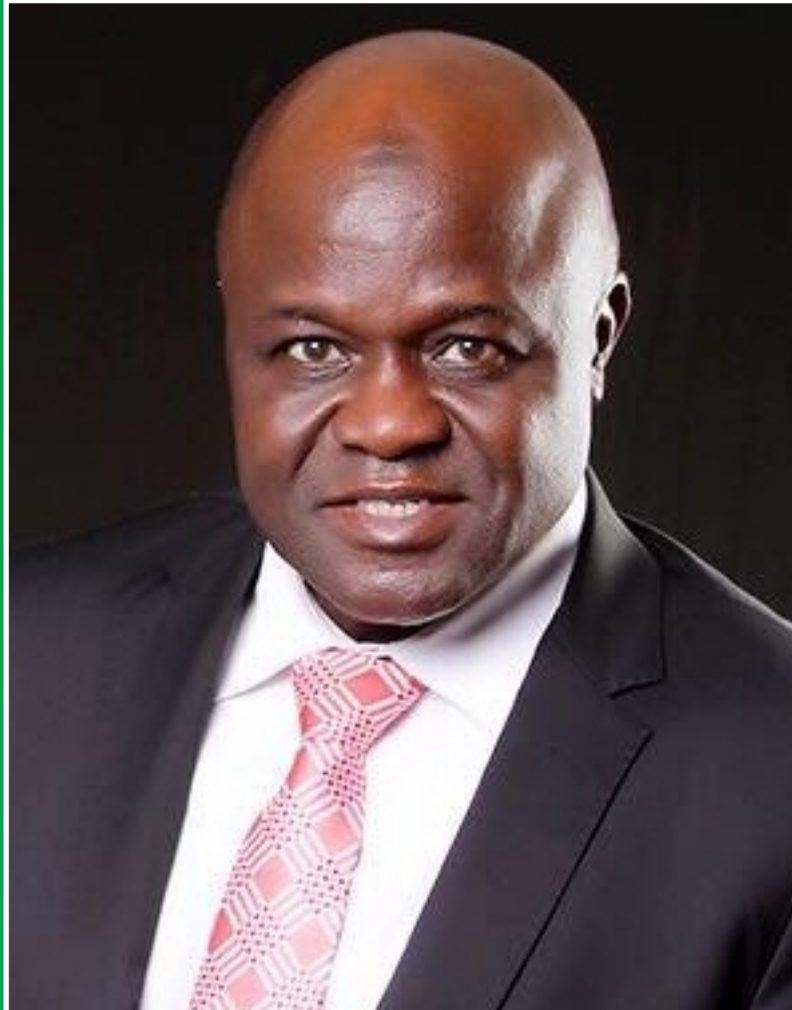

Presidential Address

Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is an honour and a privilege to stand here and welcome you wholeheartedly to the **16th Annual Conference of our Institute.**

In keeping with established tradition, this year's conference is focused on the health and well-being of our nation and her citizens. I am indeed very delighted to note that this conference has matured and grown into a well-recognized and accepted national and international event. Participants have come from far and wide in spite of the odds and the number has also increased steadily.

It has become clear in just the last two/three decades that “**security**” encompasses far more than just military considerations. An economic crisis can become a security crisis. A lack of good governance can undermine order and stability. When under pressure from criminals or disease, weak states can become failed states. Without security there can be no sustained economic development. Experience teaches that the reverse is also true: persistent and widespread poverty can also undermine the stability of a whole country.

Security challenges in any nation constitute threat to lives and property, hinder business activities and discourage local and foreign investors which invariably slow down economic growth and development. In our various discussions and engagements, we must always be aware of the range of diverse, unconventional threats that transcend national borders. Some are ancient- such as piracy, ethnic strife and poverty. Distinguished ladies and gentlemen,

National security is a determinant of development in every area of the polity. It is worthy of note that the economic, infrastructural and socio-political development of any nation state are intricately connected to the security of the nation. It therefore becomes necessary for any nation which seeks development in the above areas to strengthen its security architecture. The unimpressive performance of democratic governance, and criminality, such as armed robbery, ethnic violence, electoral violence, kidnapping, banditry and police brutality can be attributed to the negligence of the security sector. Security is therefore a critical foundation for sustainable development. Security, in this regard, implies protection from systematic human rights abuses, physical threats, violence and extreme economic, social and environmental risks, territorial and sovereignty threats. Therefore, security should be given utmost and critical attention and priority above all other interests in Nigeria because it determines the unity, integration and peaceful co-existence, which are crucial for the nation's social, political and economic development.

Performance effectiveness and professional efficiency are central to the essence of security system in the country, as they are very crucial to goal attainment, as well as optimal resource utilization in security service delivery. Professionalization of security practice at all levels is a prerequisite for the delivery of security service for attainment of a higher quality of life.

Beyond the traditional notion of security, the value of human security is paramount. This covers food security, social security, environmental security, health security, community security, and political security. There is the need to focus on social security. Social protection is concerned with protecting and helping those who are poor and vulnerable, such as children, women, elderly people, persons living with disability, the internally displaced persons, the sick, and the unemployed. These categories of people need to feel secure and safe in the society.

It is important to note that promotion of physical protection of lives and property without a corresponding effort to provide enough food for the citizenry may achieve little, because sufficiency in food production is a pre-condition for national stability.



It is generally accepted that Nigeria is a multi-religious, multi-ethnic and multi-cultural society with enormous potentials for economic, social and political development. Religious tolerance and security is particularly important because it makes people feel forgiveness, love, and peace. Intolerance, which degenerates into violence, is often traceable to the failure of human beings, without having anything to do with the nature of the religions. The major religions, Christianity, Islam and traditional worship, used to co-exist in perfect harmony. Religion should be used as a tool to moderate human behaviour for better coexistence. Nigerians, being avidly religious people, should be able to accommodate all shades of opinions.

There is also the need for protection of traditional knowledge and cultural heritage particularly in the area of security and crime prevention using approaches from African traditional knowledge. Such protections are founded on a good understanding of the distinct cultural, biological and ecological character of traditional knowledge systems. If not, we risk doing little to safeguard our traditional knowledge and this may further accelerate its rapid loss.

This applies to security and crime prevention system also. Just as security and crime prevention facilitate and encourage stability and protection through their reliance on and interaction with nature and environment, traditional communities also have acquired immense security knowledge of their natural environment.

Right now, our country is particularly in need of many dedicated security practitioners who can make detailed study and assessment of problems of crime in all its manifestations. Professional status confers on the practitioners notable benefits such as better public perception of the status of the profession to be higher than just a job. The charge, therefore, is for us gathered here today to come up with suggestions to improve the security and police architecture in Nigeria, and thereby enhance our capacity to respond effectively to the security challenges of contemporary Nigeria.

I wish to end this Address by extending my hearty congratulations to all the awardees, from the Distinguished Fellows to Associate Members of the Institute. I wish us all a fruitful deliberation.

Distinguished ladies and gentlemen.

I have the honour to congratulate the Institute on the 16th International Security Conference with the theme “EXPLORING BEST PRACTICES AND ENHANCED PROFESSIONALISM IN SECURITY AND POLICE IN NIGERIA”. This is a thrilling theme which needs serious thoughts in order to perfect the security and police architecture in Nigeria.

The increasing rate of collapsed building, disaster, flooding and accidents in Nigeria in recent times has become a common knowledge and of major concern to stakeholders in Nigerian communities. The human and maternal losses occasioned by the collapse of defective structures have assumed a frightening dimension and consequently one that requires drastic remedies.

There is a growing awareness among professionals of various backgrounds about the need to continue to expand the frontiers of knowledge in the area of sustenance of the built - environment. The feeling of insecurity is common in many urban populations. At city level, insecurity has resulted in the abandonment of certain neighborhoods, the development of architecture of fear stigmatization of neighborhood and defense mechanism. It is important to advocate the integration of security with the architecture. there at the need for these professional connections.

Architects worry about the fortress mentality of security professionals while security professionals are concerned about the failure of architects to include security elements in the design of buildings from the group up. The conflict is not over whether to include security equipment in the building design, rather the conflict lies between a building's openness on the one hand and the reasonable control of access it on the other.

Making a building secure when it was not originally designed to be secure is an expensive proposition. Architects have to sacrifice more openness in retrofitting for security, would have been the case had the building been designed for security from onset. Protection and operating expenses are greater than they need to be because of a lack of forethought during the design of a facility. This condition is particularly evident in many of today's buildings where modern design and materials can result in facilities that are especially vulnerable.

There is the need to think of practical realities of architecture of buildings and facilities. Architects, designers and security practitioners can make the greatest continuation to meeting a project's security objectives. Architects generally make the basic design decision about circulation access, building materials, check and many other features that can support or thwart overall security aims. Building clients and design professionals are not the only ones concerned about security during the design process.

Many professional jurisdictions require a security review by the security or police as part of the building permit approval process much the same as with fire safety requirements. Inspectors evaluate the plans for obvious spots, where assaults, mugging break ins and other crimes of opportunity may exist. Many jurisdictions have security regulations and ordinance that require certain lighting levels and secure doors and windows designs and hardware.



If security is treated as one of the many design requirements, then the implementation and costs for such measures will be harder to the project owners than the safety features or landscaping requirements. The basic premise of security design is that proper design and effective use of the built environment can lead to reduction in the incidents of fear of crime and to an increase in the quality of life. Let me remind you that the future transformation and innovations in security architecture of this great country depends on efficient and best professional practices in relevant fields.

This is the responsibility of the citizens policing makers the political class. I, therefore urge you to display and strictly to the tenets of professionalism and best practices in all disciplines and jurisdictions. We need to redouble our efforts to spread the gospel of best practices and professionalism.

I have to heartily congratulate the new members of the institute and the deserving Fellows and distinguished Fellows on the conferment of various awards. The strength of the institute lies in its membership therefore, I call on all categories of members and friends of the institute to discharge their obligations to the institute as desired for its developments and growth. The theme is indeed a most fitting one, having regard to the current security challenges confronting our nation, The security system has always had an important and critical role to play in tackling these challenges.

Let me take advantage of this opportunity to share with you my views on some of the issues that must be addressed if the security system is to discharge its obligations to ensure effective and efficient security operations and provide adequate anti-crime and security coverage in Nigeria,

The stakeholders in security services include public security agencies and private organized security organizations. All of them are active participants in the security architecture process. Thus, the success or failure of the security and law enforcement system is bound to impact on society's economic, social, political, stability and well-being of the nation. The success of the security system is inextricably linked to the survival of the entire Nigerian state.

Insecurity and the threat to the maintenance of law and order have assumed a frightening and alarming dimension in present day Nigeria. The scepter of terrorism looms large and threatens the very existence of the nation. The activities of the terrorists, kidnapers and similar militant groups easily underscore the rising stakes in respect of their destructive campaigns. The destabilizing impact of unrestrained and routine destruction of lives and property in the Nigerian state is worrisome and should be a matter of concern for all of us.

I am referring to the situation in which innocent civilians and, in some cases, law enforcement agencies are targeted by bombing or the explosion of various incendiary devices. This has created terror in the people and a resultant lack of confidence in the system. Nigerians are concerned and look upon the government and law enforcement agencies to live up to their constitutional responsibility of securing their lives and property.

It is noted that the whole society has been enveloped by a nauseating craze for the acquisition of money and material wealth at the expense of decency, brotherly love, moderation and the fear of God. It is advisable that the government should be determined to tackle the problem by taking pro-active steps which will enable government to be ahead of the situation. Efforts should be taken to contain the excesses of these terrorists by appropriate evaluation of their objectives and tactics with a view to countering them effectively. The option of dialogue could also be explored if situational and strategic analyses show that this is a viable approach to the solution of the problem(s) which fuel(s) the insurgency and that dialogue is needed to restore peace in troubled spots.

This year's conference theme takes into consideration the foregoing security nightmares that the nation is currently experiencing. The conference seeks to unravel the measures to be taken in order to make our security system responsive to the needs and aspirations of Nigerians through best practices and professionalism. It is our hope that the resource persons will, in the process of their presentations and discussions, endeavor to provide feasible solutions to the identified problems. It is noted that the security agencies operate in a disjointed, uncoordinated and disharmonious manner. It should be emphasized that the security of the nation is far too important to be sacrificed on the altar of political expediency and personal or group interest.

The security and law enforcement system is in need of reform similar to the situation in the United States of America following the disaster of 2001. We do not need to wait until we experience a disaster of such monumental proportions before taking necessary action to reform our security system. What is needed is the identification of the major inadequacies, problems and obstacles that are responsible for the current unsatisfactory performance of the security system. Nigerians deserve effective and accountable security forces to counter violent extremism as well as a coordinated campaign to ensure the protection of economic activities and sustained development. It is not



enough to pretend to tackle the problem by merely throwing money at it as we have done via the 2012 national budget. We have to think out of the box to unravel the causes of the ineffectiveness of our security system. The problem of insecurity is not limited to any inadequacy in the quality of the personnel who currently man the various security and law enforcement outfits. The people currently heading our security agencies are all competent men who are capable of the tasks they are constitutionally assigned to do.

The problems, it seems to me are manifold and include the following:

- (a) Our national culture and attitude towards the nation-state;
- (b) The current domestic security structure;
- (c) The current national security paradigm;
- (d) The self-immolating governing system that is currently in place;
- (e) The inadequacies in the constitution that currently guides us;
- (f) Our weak and fragmenting institutions,

There is no doubt that as we focus our attention on the improvement of the security institutions, there is need to also address those factors that constitute security challenges of our country. Indeed our current security challenges must be resolved holistically. This must include the examination of issues such as the complementary roles of citizens and communities in the fight against terrorism; the neutralization of extreme ideologies and intolerance and the development of appropriate responses to economic and social insecurities.

Apart from discussing the issues of the security institutions and the reforms that are essential to our development and secured existence, it is vital to examine that very important factor — we the people of Nigeria.

What exactly do we want? Do we truly desire a system of security that works or are we merely paying lip-service to this subject-matter? What is our attitude towards the dispensation of security and law enforcement?

The people of Nigeria, to a large extent, determine the institutions Which serve as instruments Of governance in the country indeed our Institutions mirror us. For a security practitioner to practice successfully in the 21st century he must constantly update his skills and venture into new frontiers. This is because security personnel interact in the course of discharging of their professional duties with all manners of persons and with diverse array of subject matter. They therefore need to be constantly updated on a wide variety of security issues and topics. Even in his own area of specialization, the security practitioner must be up-to-date with all developments in his chosen area.

From what has been observed above, it should be obvious that we are not getting the desired output from the security system. It is better to approach this issue by asking a number of rhetorical questions some of which include and border on the efficacy of our security system. Do we have a security system that safely secures the lives and property of Nigerians? Are the security agencies capable of providing services to the whole of Nigeria having regard to the present manner and circumstances of its existence? Why are economic crimes, violent crimes and serious white-collar crimes on the increase?

Distinguished ladies and gentlemen, there is clearly palpable frustration, even anger, in the inner-most thoughts of Nigerians that progress has not occurred fast enough inspite of the fact that providence has favoured our beloved country with abundant resources. The paradigm of tethered horses unable to benefit from the abundant food made available to them because they were pulling in different directions should provide a lesson for us in Nigeria. As long as we ponder to ethnic or regional interests to the detriment Of national interests, for so long shall we continue to suffer deprivation in the midst of plenty. In this regard, I venture to suggest that an active civil society is absolutely an essential instrument to combat corruption, serve as the conscience of the nation and hold elected officials accountable. Benefiting from the resources of the nation must not be dependent on where one has come from — a mere accident of birth over which none of us has any control.

Conclusion

The need to review and overhaul the present security system cannot be over-emphasized. It requires that we all be disciplined and focused. We must change our approach to national issues if we are to succeed as a nation. Our security system must be thoroughly refurbished and strengthened. It is not about wanting to rub shoulders with technologically advanced nations or seeking to be a permanent member of the Security Council of the United Nations just to boost our ego as a nation. It is about making realistic changes which will enable us put our house in order and earn the respect of other nations.

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Over the years, the increasing incidence of criminal activities in Nigeria have generated a great deal of attention not only among certain individual but also in the education system. Among the crimes associated with this system, the most prevailing ones are banditry and kidnapping. This has led to significant reduction in productivity and functioning of educational institutions among many other consequences. This paper is historical as examines the concepts of banditry and kidnapping activities and its impact on Nigeria education system. 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Since its independence in 1960, Nigeria has experienced two major forms of governance. The autocratic rule by the military which forces itself on the citizens, and the democratic rule by politicians who are voted into office by citizens. During military rule, the conduct of security professionals' sways in both directions of ethical comportment. While the military is known to be intoxicated by power and disregard ethical standards, other security agencies including the police are either constrained by intimidation or by the inferiority position posed to them by the military. In this era, the military is the only organization that flexibly disregards the ethics of professionalism but also enforces discipline in security professionals. As confusing as this may appear, the law and authorities provide and ensure, as well as demand and expect strict discipline for and from security professionals respectively. The democratic rule offers a little balance between the military and all the security agencies as the police and other non-military agencies craft their empowerment from the system which is headed by a civilian leader. This on its own, presents regular power tussles which explains the constant physical altercations between the military and various law enforcement and paramilitary organizations. This system of governance in some ways, turns a blind eye to ethical issues from its security practitioners, causing breaches in security procedures and engagements, leading to diverse security challenges such as kidnapping, terrorism, smuggling, human trafficking, and prostitution. The connivance and the involvement of top management officers of law enforcement in corruption, and the religious fanaticism of some law enforcement officers sharing ideologies with terrorists or being sympathetic to their course are a few motives for ethical dilemmas within the Nigerian security structure. This paper highlights major ethical issues and the behavioural patterns among the nation's security professionals, and the implications of their actions to citizens, communities, the nation, as well as the international community. The paper examined the roles of the government, police, multi-track security system and other informal security agencies. The paper discusses the prominent stakeholders in plural policing and militia security groups. It emphasises on the current forms and patterns between these stakeholders and the police. The paper advocates for enhancement of neighbourhood security and appropriate interventions related to the specific needs of individual areas. A framework for better understanding of such issues and how to address them are proffered. This paper seeks to examine prospects of public policing, community policing and neighbourhood watch for security and sustenance of peace in our societies. It is expected that secured communities be created to ensure a comfortable and liveable environment for the residents and citizens. There is urgent need to strengthen and empower credible informal security groups in order to the strengthen community security.

**TITLE:****SECURITY PRACTICE: NEED FOR STANDARDISATION AND PROFESSIONALISM****AUTHOR(S)****ABSTRACT**

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Standard work procedures are the “how” of tasks description and practice of operations of a profession. Standard work procedures provide the minimum standard of best practice which is an amalgam of disciplines that is moving inexorably towards professionalisation. The idea of security as a profession remains as difficult and elusive as a comprehensive definition of security that captures all of its modern facets and many actors. The view of elevating such a discipline as security to the status of a profession provokes polarised opinions. This paper reviews the literature, examining what elements identify a security professional and exploring the significant themes and issues relating to protection practice. To support these elements, security experts will be exhausted using a multidimensional scaling technique to assess what constitutes a suitable and validated body of knowledge. It is concluded that many of the issues pivotal for progressing security towards professionalism are being addressed. However, there exists a need for research into developing a consensus and functional unity among the various branches of the security profession, and to identify emergent issues that affect security as a profession. One approach put forward by this paper is that a singular body of knowledge, in part, that can aid in the understanding of security.

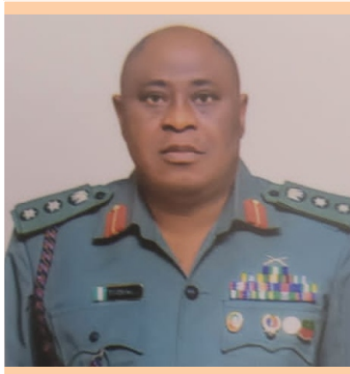

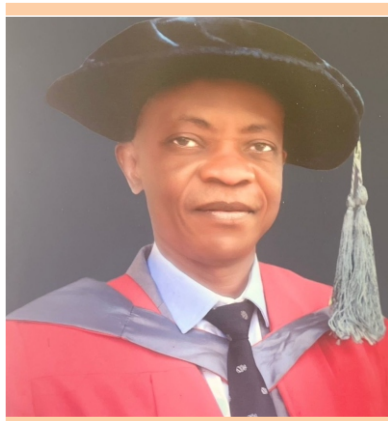
**PROF. MOHAMMED
